An atmospheric mix of nature writing, folklore and archaeological analysis, William Young's Ghosts of the Forest delves into "the country under the countries" – a lost land that gave birth to the many vivid and enigmatic legends associated with the Border region. Once known as Yr Hen Ogledd or the Old North, it was a Celtic land with beliefs and a way of life that left a profound mark on the folk cultures of the region. Join William as he journeys into the remote moors and forests of the Borders to seek out the ancient hillforts, sacred stones and holy wells where traces of this lost culture still linger – in doing so revealing how the region has shaped the course of European civilisation in ways we are only beginning to understand.

Hindsight is the story of writer and theatremaker Jenna Watt's experience of stalking a deer hind on a vast Highland estate as part of an attempt to understand the shifting baselines of 'rewilding', and what it means emotionally and physically to participate in Scotland's deer cull. In what is an insightful. non-scientific exploration of wilderness and Highland identity, she unravels the story of that day's hunt, interlaced with a discovery that her ancestors were deer stalkers. gamekeepers and ghillies who participated in what are now considered by many as ecologically damaging land practices. Jenna Watt appears in conversation with Amanda Thomson, author of belonging.

Car Parking

Use the Edinburgh Road Car Park. It is free every day except Saturday from 8.30am to 5.30pm. From the car park, take the pedestrian footpath towards town. The Eastgate is a 2 to 3 minute walk.

By Bus – Borders Buses run regular services to/from Edinburgh via Penicuik, and to/from Galashiels via Innerleithen and Walkerburn. The nearest bus stop (for buses in both directions) is opposite the theatre, at the Post Office.

Tickets

You can buy tickets in person at Box Office, over the phone on 01721 725777 or online at www.eastgatearts.com
Pay using cash, cheque, debit or credit cards (excluding AmEx).

Tickets can be kept at the box office for collection, or posted out for a £1.50 charge.

Reservations

We will only reserve tickets for groups of 10 or more. Any group reservations not paid for within an agreed timescale will be released for general sale.

Refunds

Refunds are only given if a show is cancelled. Tickets may be exchanged or transferred at the discretion of the Box Office Manager. For shows which sell out we will try to resell any tickets returned, but this cannot be guaranteed.

Data protection

All customer details are treated confidentially. The Eastgate adheres to all GDPR rules on customer data.

Special effects

We will inform you as soon as we find out a show has special effects. Often we are not told in advance so please look out for signs in the foyer.

Latecomers

If you are delayed and miss a show start time we will do our best to admit you as soon as we can to a seat at the back of the auditorium (to minimise disturbance). You may have to wait until a suitable break in the show and, occasionally, until the interval.

Accessibility

The Eastgate has level access, adapted toilet facilities and a passenger lift. There are six spaces to accommodate wheelchairs (please book in advance through Box Office). The seating bank is also fitted with grab rails.

Babies/young children

Are welcome in the café and the theatre. In the theatre under-two year olds are classified as babes in arms and can sit on adult's knees but must still have a ticket (it will be issued free by Box Office). Adults may be asked to remove noisy children from the theatre.


Assist dogs


Are welcome, the front row offers the best space for dogs to lie down beside their owners, just ask at Box Office.


